Note: Psalm 26 is very important in the sacred liturgy. It begins with the famous words: *Dominus illuminatio mea et salus mea: quem timebo?* (“The Lord is my light and my salvation, whom shall I fear?”). The antiphon set to music here by Maria Quinn is from its sixth verse.

The following verses—which are optional—can elongate the piece, helping it match the liturgical action. They come from Psalm 26; that is, the same Psalm the antiphon comes from.

ÿ. Ú-nam pé-ti- i a Dómino, hanc re-*quí*- ram, ut in-há-bi-tem in dómo

Dómi-ni ómnibus di- é-bus *ví*-tæ mé- æ.

English Translation of the verses : “One thing I have asked of the Lord, this will I seek after; that I may dwell in the house of the Lord all the days of my life, resting content in the Lord’s goodness, gazing at his temple.”

ÿ. Ut ví-de- am vo-luptá-tem *Dó*-mi-ni, et ví-si-tem *tém*-plum é- jus.
