FOR EWORD

The Reverend Charles Winfred Douglas, Doctor of Music, was surely one of the most important musicians to have served the Church in the United States. He did more than any other person to restore the ancient glory of plainsong to our Church, and his influence will be felt for a very long time to come. At the time of his death in January 1944, he still was working on many projects. One of the most significant and useful of these was the material here included in the St. Dunstan Hymnal, which contains a large number of plainsong hymns for all of which Father Douglas provided accompaniments at one time or another in his long career.

This collection is a compilation of hymns and tunes assembled from *The Monastic Diurnal* with its musical setting, the *Ceremonial of the Community of Saint Mary*, and *The Hymnal* 1940. The whole has been arranged and edited with loving care by a Sister of the Community of Saint Mary, who for many years was Father Douglas's student and faithful helper.

Most authorities realize that plainsong is most properly performed unaccompanied. However, if it is to be supported by harmonies played on the organ, it is useful to have models of unobtrusive accompaniments to assist the learner; these may be withdrawn later when the choir is ready to sing without instrumental assistance. There are various theories as to how accompaniments to plainsong should be written. One enthusiast even suggested that the accompaniments be atonal. Another advocated crude organum. Dr. Woodward simply leaves the matter to each organist. Father Douglas, however, avoided extremes; his earlier harmonizations seem to follow the four-voice pattern, whereas his later style tends to be more free and more varied. It is instructive to compare the accompaniment he made to "Of the Father's Love Begotten" for the *New Hymnal* 1916, with the one set to the same melody in *The Hymnal* 1940. It goes without saying that his accompaniments are completely modal.

I predict a wide use of this Hymnal, knowing that it will assist in drawing the faithful closer to God in their corporate worship. We are all deeply grateful to the Sister Editor for the many hours she has given to this work, and we all realize the depth of her scholarship, her meticulous care; and that she, following her revered teacher, did all of her work to the glory of Almighty God and to the singing of His praises in His Church.

EDITOR'S PREFACE

During his thirty-eight years as Choirmaster of the Community of Saint Mary, Canon Winfred Douglas supplied us with a series of manuscript accompaniments for the plainsong hymns of our office books. These were constantly revised as they were used under his direction in the choirs of our Community. A majority of those selected for the present volume were finally revised by him during the period of preparation for *The Hymnal* 1940; a few of an earlier period he left as they were.

The ninety-two texts included are chiefly from *The Monastic Diurnal* (Oxford University Press, 1932), *The Order of Matins according to the Use of the Community of Saint Mary* (Saint Mary's Convent, Peekskill, 1916), and *The Ceremonial of the Community of Saint Mary* (Saint Mary's Convent, Peekskill, 1923).

Where one tune serves for several texts in the breviary, we chose the words which seemed most generally useful. Where one hymn has several tunes, the extra melodies are applied to texts which would otherwise be omitted.

Although the book is not intended as a final authority on sources, we have tried to obtain accurate information on authors and translators, and are especially indebted in this matter to *Hymns of the Breviary and Missal* by Dom Matthew Britt, O. S. B. In his Introduction, Dom Matthew refers to *The Monastic Diurnal* as "one of the best sources from which to obtain translations of the original text. The translations, including those made by the author, are of a high order."

Of the tunes, more than half are found in the *Sarum Antiphonal*. Others are from various continental rites, and are so noted in the Douglas manuscripts. For the convenience of those who use the book for the service of Benediction, we have included one final antiphon, *Ego sum panis* with Psalm 117, from our *Ceremonial Noted*.
