HIS GLORIA BEGAN with everyone singing (after the intonation by the priest). By "everyone" we mean: cantrix, congregation, and choir. The congregation does not sing during the middle section, which is SATB polyphony. But at the end (starting at the words "for you alone") we recommend having everyone sing.






